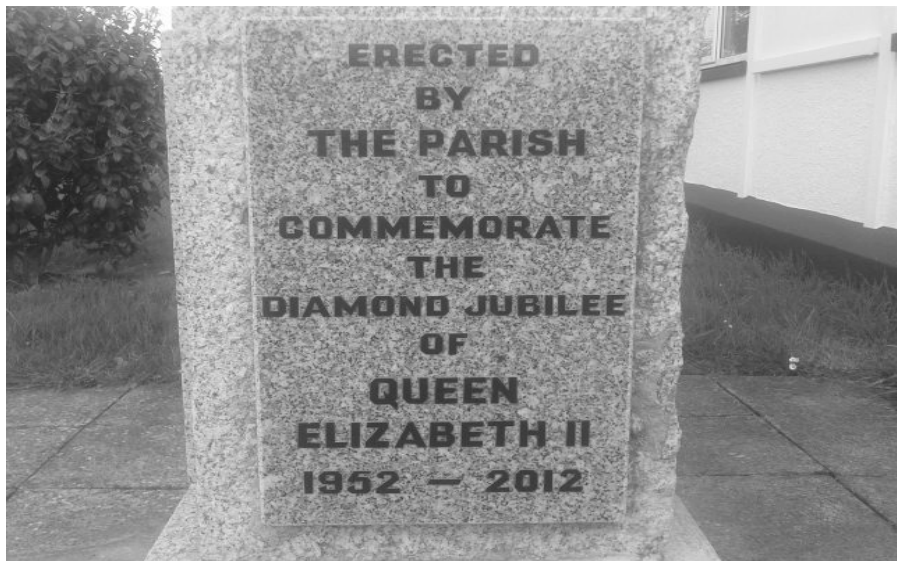

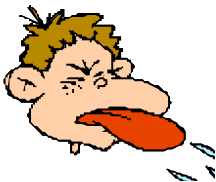
Parish Council Update

Lemon Ice and Minty Strawberries

Barney Desmazery's fruity summer dessert is totally fat free and a great palate-cleanser

Method.

1. To make the lemon ice, tip the lemons into a blender with the sugar and 500ml/18fl oz of water. Blitz everything for a minute or two until the lemon is chopped to a pulp. Strain the juice into a shallowish freezer container, pressing down on the lemon pulp with the back of a large spoon to release as much flavour as possible. Discard the pulp.

2. Reserve two tablespoons of the juice in a medium bowl. Cover the rest with cling film and put in the freezer for four hours or until firm.

There's no need to wash the blender yet.

3. When the juice is frozen, break it into chunks and tip it back into the blender. Blitz until it's a smooth sorbet consistency. Tip it back into the freezer container and return it to the freezer for another 30 minutes to firm up.

4. While the ice is freezing, hull and slice the strawberries, roughly chop the mint, then toss them together in the reserved lemon juice. When the ice is scoopable, spoon it into bowls and top with the strawberries.



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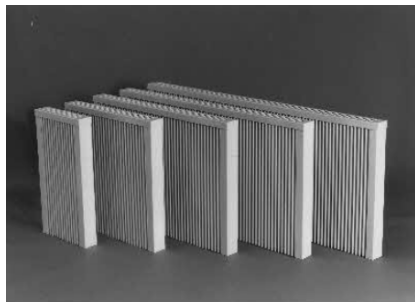

2. Minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting of 1st April 2010.

The minutes were approved at the Parish Council meeting held on 2nd June 2011

3. Reports from Organisations in the Parish.

The No Man's Land Memorial Hall Committee: The Hall continues to go from strength to strength. Our Jumble Sales are always well supported and happen about every two months. Christmas and Easter Bingo continues to pull in the crowds. Both our Spring and Summer Flower Shows attracted high quality entries even if the number of people attending was somewhat down on previous years.

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The Annual Parish Meeting

We were very proud to have been able to raise £500 for Children's Hospice South West with our September Jumble Sale.

The hall is regularly used by many groups including Mother and Toddlers, Yoga and Art Classes. It has also been booked on many occasions for private functions.

Once again we have carried out work to improve the hall, this year's project to improve access via a new door and ramp at the side of the hall. All of the allotments are full and we have a waiting list to take them on if any become empty.

Once again we were able to take the seniors of the Parish to Christmas Lunch at Bindown Gold club, thanks to the kind generosity of Mr. Tillbrook.

All in all it has been a successful year and plans are afoot for the hall to celebrate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in June with a tea party. We would still love to see more residents at our regular events. The hall will always need local support. We are also actively looking for new Committee Members.

Neighbourhood Watch: Councillor Reynolds reported no significant activity to report again this year.

St Martin PCC: Councillor Reynolds has not been informed of any meetings during the last 12 months. She will make contact with the Secretary to ensure invitations are sent out.

4. Report from Chair of Parish Council.

As in previous years the Council has dealt with a wide range of subjects ranging from housing issues to planning applications, the majority of which has been straightforward. However, it should be noted that the liaison between this Council and Cornwall Council has not necessarily resulted in the solutions the Council or parishioners expected. In some circumstances, despite the strongest efforts of the Council, the liaison has proved totally ineffective. These issues apart, this Council have not been affected too much by the policy changes, budget restraints and devolving of services imposed by Cornwall Council. In last year's report I referred to the efforts to reduce the speed limits through No Man's Land reduced to a more sensible and safer limits. Unfortunately, despite the efforts of all concerned, this is still ongoing. However, I am glad to report the work to upgrade the sewage works has been completed, with the additional benefit of more parking spaces being created.

The Annual Parish Meeting

It is expected that a planning application to build additional housing on the estate will soon be submitted to Cornwall Council. Following discussions with the Duchy of Cornwall it is hoped that it will be possible for the Council to lease an area of land, so that the first play and recreation area in the Parish can be provided.

The meetings of the Council have been well attended by parishioners who raised matters or issues in the public participation period of the meetings. As result of requests from parishioners the Council has provided additional 'salt/grit' bins at Millendreath and at the top of Tregoad Hill, all that is needed now is the weather to go with them!!

My personal thanks must go to my fellow Councillors for the support they have provided over the last 12 months. I must also thank the local constabulary for not only attending meetings, but for the safe policing of the Parish. I would also like to thank the parishioners who take the time to attend meetings, not only to raise issues, but to see and hear what their Council does for them. Special thanks must also go to Charles the Parish Clerk who has once again not only provided excellent support and advice to the Council, but produced the much valued parish magazine. These thanks are especially important given the personal circumstances he has been coping with over the preceding 4 months.

I know this report should be an overview of the previous year, but I think it right and proper to consider the future. The next 12 months will be an important time for this Council, as it will be essential to consider the impact the new planning legislation will have on this Parish and the surrounding area. As such, it will probably be necessary to liaise with other local Councils to ensure that appropriate policies are in place to cope with future building development within the Parish and in other Council areas.

Agenda Item 4: St Martin-By-Looe News:

An exciting year that saw the Parish Magazine change to a quarterly publication, averaging 28 pages. We now publish electronically via our website www.stmartinbylooe.pc.btck.co.uk, this has proved popular and I have received some great feedback from not only our Parishioners but also people from outside the Parish.

Advertisers continue to support the publication with 16 advertisements carried in the last edition.

Advertising rates continue to be competitive and are set to cover costs; however a small profit is usually made which goes towards the No Man's Land playground fund.

To date we have raised £292.50 towards play equipment.

Print costs look set to rise in 2012/13 as Cornwall Council have removed the special Parish Council tariff and replaced it with a tariff more commonly found in outside printers.

I will continue to monitor the costs and will seek alternative quotes from other printers once I know future print costs. Advertising rates may well have to increase but I would like to avoid this if possible.

Editorial content is always difficult to source and at times can be extremely frustrating especially as little or no contribution is made by the Parishioners themselves. However I must thank our Chairman Mr. Kim Smith and Millendreath resident Jenny Wallis for their excellent articles and stories, without their help job would be much harder.

I would encourage all Parish Councillors to try to get the Parishioners to contribute stories, there must be things happening out in the Parish worth shouting about, special birthdays, anniversaries, children's events and achievements, all of these things would make interesting reading.

I look forward to another great year.

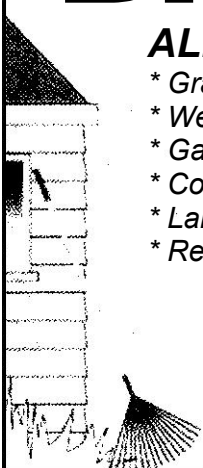

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Indoor Herb Growing Kits

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Once you have sown your seeds and they have germinated, usually within around seven days or so, there is very little you need to do. Just keep them somewhere with good light, a windowsill that receives plenty of sun is ideal, and keep them well watered and give them a fortnightly feed with a soluble plant fertilizer and they will grow away happily just waiting for you to harvest them.

There's lots of herbs you can easily grow indoors,

Thyme, Dill, Tarragon, Basil, Rosemary, Chives, Mint, Parsley Marjoram, Oregano, Sage, Fennel, Borrag

All of these will grow well indoors and they are all ideal for flavouring your food and adding to your cooking.

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History Snippet *by Jenny* *Introducing Osbert*

The man of the moment back in the thirteenth century was a man called Osbert – Osbert de Treverya. Osbert was around when Magna Carta was signed and Henry 111 took over as king. Surnames had not been invented so Osbert identified himself as being associated with the ‘vill’ of Treveria. Treveria has Cornish roots – a farmstead by the ploughlands – and by 1220 it belonged to Bucklawren Manor and the Launceston Priory. Osbert must have been well-connected because he held lands of ‘Lostruc’ by charter from the Priory. “Lostruc” later became Skreek and Osbert had houses and other buildings there with one acre of land. This was probably a Cornish acre – 60 English acres!

In his heyday Osbert was a mover and shaker in the community. Looe was on the up with Royal consent for a fair and Market. Osbert was involved with the paperwork when the widow Lucy Russell, Lady of Pendrym, bequeathed a quarter of an acre of land in the new borough of East Looe to build a chapel. This was for the ‘salvation of her soul and souls of her ancestors and successors’. It was essential to ensure your place in heaven. The building is now converted into housing, the answer to someone else’s prayers perhaps!

Another project endorsed by our Osbert was the matter of obtaining -

permission for Robert, Lord of Lydcott, to build a dam on the Priory's water from Bonyalva (on the Seaton river) to strengthen his mill. They settled on an annual fee of 6d payable at Michaelmas 'for ever' –or lose the right. Inflation wasn't an issue then.

Meanwhile, further up the river, William Scorch died. He had been paid 6d a year by the Priory for a weir to be put on his land at Carlean. Osbert is there to persuade the widow Matilda Scorch to forego this payment. She signs an agreement to PAY the Priory 6d per annum 'for the soul of William and the souls of her mother and father'! This smacks of extortion and Osbert is beginning to look like the playground bully.

With all this involvement in mills, Osbert decides to invest in the new technology himself. He builds a mill at 'Loscruc'. Pendrym had a mill. Bucklawren had a mill. Bonyalva had a mill. But mills were only allowed by licence. Each manor mill collected a portion of grain as tax and passed it to the landowner. (Pay-as-you-grind!) This was called a multure. Osbert was defrauding the Priory. He had to resign his charter. He got compensation of 2 marks of silver but had to take an oath NEVER to build a mill in Treveria again.

So Osbert can take his well-earned place in the Parish History – the first man to breach Planning Regulations! Eight hundred years ago!

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St Martins-by-Looe Bellringers. A Plea to the Parish.

There are six bells in the tower of St Martins-by-Looe church. These six bells belong to you, the people who live in this parish. Have you ever seen them? Have you ever heard them? Have you ever wondered how long they have been in the tower? Have you ever been to a wedding in the church where the bride was serenaded by the bells on what is probably the most important day of her life? Do you like to hear the bells at Christmas, such a joyous sound. Did you wonder who was ringing them? Would you like to know how they are rung? Do you know the people who care for them so lovingly, just as the people that have gone before have cared for them? These bells have a history. They have been here for generations, doing a job, providing a service.

Did you know there is a real danger they may stop ringing? No more joyous Christmas. No more serenading the bride. No more calling people to service. No more ringing them just for fun (Yes, we do that too).

They may become obsolete, like an old washing machine, phone or computer. What if they do? Do you care?

Ringling the bells is a skill, an art form that sadly without new people willing to learn, and this means you, dear parishioner, will die out. Don't let your bells die. Come on a journey with us and learn to ring these precious bells that have been so lovingly rung here for generations. Come and join us, be part of a team. We will teach you. It is easier than you think.

It has taken and it still takes a lot of hard work and dedication to keep the bells ringing, for you, in our church. Let us keep them ringing for the generations to come.
