#### **Planning Applications**

Only one was received during this period.

PA24/01461. **Proposal:** Proposed creation of 6 additional touring pitches, retention of the permeable surfacing in respect of 6 existing touring pitches, use of 5 existing touring pitches approved under PA16/05973 for year-round holiday use, and extension to toilet/shower block. **Location:** The Oaks Holiday Park Bucklawren Road, No Mans Land, Looe.

#### The Annual Parish Council Meeting — May 9th

The election of officers took place to serve until May 2025. Robert Henly was once again voted to remain as Chairman and Roberta Powley was voted to remain as Vice Chairman. Councillor Keeble was voted to remain in charge of Data Protection monitoring, Councillor Lawes represents the Parish Council for Rights of Way, Councillor Reynolds will represent the Parish Council on transport issues and will also stand as the Parish Council representative on the No Man's Land Hall committee. Vice Chairman Powley will continue to represent the Parish Council on the St Martin's School Trust. The Clerk will be responsible for liaising with Cornwall Association of Local Councils.


# No Man's Land Monthly Produce Market

#### History Snippet by Jenny Wallis

Well the oaks are definitely in leaf before the ash! So it's going to be a dry summer. Good news! But the 8 months of rain has left me wondering where it all went - and how the watercourses of the parish have shaped our landscape.

A river map shows that our parish had ample supplies of water, both from springs and rainfall catchment. Old manuscripts tell of harnessing water, digging ditches, building aqueducts and leats to power mills. All the landholdings were bounded by streams (before barbed wire!) so they were important legal statements. Many of these boundaries still exist today and I was delighted to find old **Celtic water-words** still lingering in our parish Tithe Map!

The Celts in Europe back in BC had many words for water. Like emojis today, people needed a universally-understood descriptive language so they could describe journeys before OS maps and sat-navs. Here I want to record this bit of our history that may otherwise wash away.


**East Looe River** rises on Bodmin moor and is the western parish boundary. Lough, loch, loo described a deep pool connected to the sea. The original one is probably out by the island and is now underwater! The word would have then been given to the whole river by map-makers, eventually including its tributary and thus we have the West and East Looe rivers with towns to match.

Seaton River rises on Bodmin Moor and forms the original eastern boundary of the parish. It was used to run between East and West

Wivelshire back in the day. Old documents record **Seythyn**. Celtic **Sid** describes a fast-flowing river in a flat-bottomed valley with steep sides! **Hyn** is Cornish for 'boundary'.

**Rive Lym** used to run from Millendreath and flow into the River Looe. The tide has come in! But the **Limmicks** remain on the map! **Lym** was a river by elm trees. It was written **Lamana** in Latin documents. The 'wick' was involved with saltmaking.

**River Bune** is the north-western extent of the parish. It has been managed over the centuries to form fishing lakes. Still running past Bunny's Hill in Longcoe, it described a slow-moving watercourse through reed-beds.

**Dovers** is draining water into Millendreath peat bog. Celtic for a watery place.

**Shutta** is a cascade of water. It was 'Le Shute', which could mean it was man-made. The area above was Pitt Land where one 'pitt ' still exists as St Martin's Well.

**Burns Bush** is a stream in Struddicks. Map makers often heard something and wrote down what they thought! This has nothing to do with Moses. It's Old English, **burna byse**, a stream in a thicket.

**River Kenal,** in Keveral, is a small stream. - so there must have been a bigger one nearby!

**River Nean** flows down to drain into the parish and the settlement by it is called Trenean. Like its Northampton namesake, people were describing a stream that rose rapidly in heavy rainstorms.

**River Sheral** contributes to our northern edge. Babbling brook, going downhill!

Such a musical name! Could catch on!



# The Intruder

The 7<sup>th</sup> May was a beautiful Spring day with warm sunshine and a light breeze – such a change from the heavy rain and high winds we have experienced for weeks – but the best sign of Spring was yet to come.

Among the chorus of birdsong that was present came the unmistakeable call of the Cuckoo – a sound I have only heard two or three times in the last 45 years since moving to Cornwall.

The Cuckoo was so common in the East of England years ago that you could almost guarantee seeing the actual bird on walks in the countryside. Most people are familiar with the birds breeding procedure of laying its eggs in another bird's nest at the cost of removing the hosts chicks, therefore allowing the young Cuckoo to eat all the food brought in by the hosts. Because their young are raised by another bird, the adult Cuckoos are free to leave the UK and return to their Winter home in Africa, normally in June. Although this seems harsh, as for every Cuckoo that is raised at least three to four host chicks will perish, research has shown that it does not have a high impact on the host species numbers. The nests chosen are mainly that of Meadow Pipits, Dunnocks and Reed Warblers. Unfortunately status reports do show that the Cuckoo is in heavy decline and listed on the British Trust for Ornithology Red List of endangered species.

One other bird that I have reported on in the past, also on the Red List, is the Turtle Dove. This bird also migrates to the UK, via Europe, from West Africa – the few birds that do arrive on our shores can now be found on farm land in the South East and Eastern England. Research has shown that the loss of feeding habitat in the UK has had a major part to play in the declining numbers.

Another factor up until recently was the unsustainable hunting of the birds on their migration through France, Spain and Portugal. Every Autumn around one million were legally hunted – the consequence of this was bird numbers travelling to the UK dropped by 97%. However, one piece of good news regarding their future is a group of enthusiasts formed Operation Turtle Dove with the aim of helping the bird numbers to increase. This is being achieved by providing suitable habitat for the birds to feed and breed – farmers are playing a big part by such simple means as leaving wild areas to establish feeding sites and hedges are being left to mature for the birds to nests. Possibly the best single thing that could affect numbers was an action plan which resulted in the European Commission halting the hunting of Turtle Doves from 2021 to 2023.

That was very good news but we must watch this space.

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# **Cornwall Hopes to Lead The Way**



Ambitions to make Cornwall a leader in clean energy have received a major boost with a £4.5m investment in a range of projects from the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly Good Growth Programme, which is managed by Cornwall Council and funded by the Government's UK Shared Prosperity Fund.

The strategic investment recently announced will accelerate Cornwall's goal to maximise the opportunities for floating offshore wind (FLOW) generation in the Celtic Sea and establish the region as a key player in the UK's transition to clean energy in the pursuit of net zero. It will also complement other marine-related Good Growth Programme investments including £2m towards future green skills and a £973,000 study to assess potential opportunities at Falmouth Docks. Council Leader Linda Taylor said:

"We are committed to a sustainable future and to Cornwall's net zero journey which is why we are making targeted Good Growth investments in high value and high growth sectors. Floating Offshore Wind (FLOW) has the potential to be a once in a generation opportunity for Cornwall in terms of supply chain, renewable energy, job opportunities and economic growth.

"We are strategically located for FLOW in the Celtic Sea and welcome the opportunities that it can bring for our residents in terms of job opportunities, economic growth and our sustainable future."

# **Bakewell tart recipe**

This fragrant almond tart is a classic British dessert and true family favourite. This traditional Bakewell tart recipe includes buttery homemade pastry with a thick layer of raspberry jam and a soft frangipane topping. Serve warm with cream or custard, or cool completely and enjoy with a cuppa.

#### Ingredients For the pastry

200g plain flour 1 tbsp icing sugar, plus extra to decorate 125g butter

1 egg yolk Serves 12— 485 calories/ serving Vegetarian



For the filling 180g butter, softened 180g caster sugar 3 eggs 180g ground almonds 1 tsp almond extract 200g raspberry conserve 25g flaked almonds



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# **Bakewell tart recipe**

#### Method

Sieve the flour and icing sugar into a bowl. Rub in the butter. Add the egg yolk and 2 tsp water and mix to a firm dough. Roll out onto a lightly floured board and use to line a deep 23cm loose-based, fluted tart tin. Chill for 15 mins.

Heat the oven to gas 4, 180°C, fan 160°C. Bake the pastry case 'blind' for 15 mins. Remove the paper and baking beans and cook for a further 10 mins until the pastry is dry and a light golden colour. Remove from the oven and leave to cool.

**For the filling,** beat together the butter and sugar. Beat in the eggs, one at a time, then stir in the ground almonds and almond extract. Spread the jam over the base of the pastry case. Spread the almond filling evenly on top, then sprinkle over the flaked almonds.

Bake for 35–40 mins until the frangipane filling is firm and golden brown on top (see Tips, below). Allow to cool slightly and serve while just warm or cool completely in the tin. Carefully remove from the tin and dust with icing sugar just before serving, perhaps with cream or custard, if you like.

Tips: Frangipane is a classic dessert filling made with ground almonds which help to keep it moist when baked. The filling should be soft and have a damp crumb texture, more like a set custard than a fluffy sponge. If the filling still feels very liquid after 40 mins baking, cover the top with foil to stop it from browning and return to the oven for another 5-10 mins or until the filling is just set.

The filling will firm up as it cools and is best sliced and served while just warm (allow to cool for 10-15 mins once out of the oven) or once completely cold. This makes it a great dessert to prepare ahead; the baked tart will keep for 1-2 days in an airtight container.

Make sure you have a deep tart tin to fit the thick layer of filling. A loose-based or springform tin will help you remove the tart when baked.

## Millie Chilli Swimmers and the Cornwall Air Ambulance



The Millie Chilly swimmers are at it again! Throughout this year year we're raising money for the Cornwall Air Ambulance Trust #Heli2 appeal for a much needed second helicopter. This kicked off in February when a group of intrepid

swimmers undertook the "Brave the Blue" challenge which meant a dip or swim in cold water everyday of the month. They achieved this in various ingenious ways when weather or the all-too-regular sewage alerts at Millendreath made a sea swim inadvisable. With the generous match funding from Lloyds Bank over £1,000 was raised.

As I was unable to do this after a bad arm injury in January, instead I managed to raise a further £205 in March by challenging myself to complete 3 sessions of therapy, plus a general exercise session; daily. So all together a cheque for £1,315 was



presented to the Air Ambulance when four of the group visited the Newquay base in May. These lucky four had a great time, and even got to sit in the helicopter without having had an accident!

But we haven't stopped there! Oh, no! Our inspirational fund-raiser-in- chief, Karen, has designed, written and illustrated a children's book, Millie Chilly Mermaid, and we're now selling this in various ways. Copies are available in the Millendreath Beach Shack, along with our postcards featuring shots from our various swims and pictures from the book. Other talented swimmers are producing various craft items,



and some were on sale, along with the book, at the Swim, Run, Paddle" challenge at Sibleyback where we ran a stall. Our next planned event is a "Pirates and Mermaids" stall on the beach at Millendreath during half term week, where we'll be selling cakes, books and other items, together with fun things to do for adults and children alike.
